

CPUE Study

- Contract 3 local crab fishermen
- Sample every other week
 - ~10-30% of the gear are TED traps
 - TEDs are 2 x 6 inches made of stiff wire











Evaluation of Turtle Excluder Devices (TEDs)

- Results cover data from May – December 2007
- NO Diamondback Terrapins were collected from any trap in this study
- Catch per unit effort (CPUE)= crabs-trap-1-day-1
- On average, the TED traps collected fewer nonharvestable crabs (sublegal and ovigerous crabs) than did standard traps

Evaluation of Turtle Excluder Devices (TEDs)

- Sex (legal crabs)
 - Males
 - More in TED traps
 - Females
 - More in Standard traps

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	Standard Traps	TED Traps
Males	1.52	1.77
Females	3.67	3.40

- Size (carapace width)
 - All Crabs
 - Larger in TED traps
 - Legal Crabs
 - Larger in TED traps

Carapace Width (mm)

	Standard Traps	TED Traps
All Crabs	146.4	150.5
Legal Crabs	154.6	155.5

Summary

 TEDs have no affect on the crab catch or sex

- TEDs may have an influence on crab size
 - TED traps catch larger crabs
