However, it is with a heavy heart that this award is given posthumously, as he passed away suddenly at his home on January 31, 2008. He is survived by his wife, Elaine, and daughter, Rachel. His sharp wit, engaging smile, and unconditional friendship will be greatly missed.


Ralph first joined Texas Sea Grant in 1975 as the marine agent for Aransas and San Patricio Counties. He left the program in January 1978 to become the Executive Director of the Texas Shrimp Association (TSA), an offshore shrimping industry trade organization. During his 12-year tenure with TSA, Ralph used his considerable intellect and people skills to help resolve a longstanding dispute between conservationists and shrimpers over sea turtles. Ralph moved from the TSA to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) in 1989, where he served in several capacities. As head of the Department's Coastal Fisheries Division, Ralph implemented the State's shrimp management and artificial reef programs. He spent his last eight years with TPWD as Director of Intergovernmental Affairs, where he was the agency's liaison with the Texas Legislature, U.S. Congress, and other governmental agencies. He returned to Sea Grant in 1999 as Associate Director for Outreach. His incredible work ethic, professionalism and outgoing personality made an immediate impact on the Texas Sea Grant Program and the National Sea Grant Network.

In addition to his untiring work in the fisheries arena, Ralph was in the U. S. Armed Forces for 28 years, first as an active duty Army Officer (in Air Defense Artillery and in the Engineering Branch) and then a Reserve Officer (in Topography), where he retired as a Lieutenant Colonel (LTC) culminating his career in the Office of the Chief of Engineers at the Pentagon, Washington, DC. His time in the military helped him develop his strong sense of discipline, motivation and perseverance which served him well in becoming a respected and esteemed fisheries professional.

Mr. Rayburn was a tireless advocate for the protection of marine resources in the Gulf of Mexico and was respected by all who knew him. He will be sorely missed. It is with tremendous pride and honor that the Gulf States Marine Fisheries Commission presents this year's *Charles H. Lyles Award* to such a deserving recipient.
